Chief's Corner

May traditionally begins with our services and programs in recognition of Police Month. The Police Chaplains, under the leadership of Rev. Matt Hoffman, once again put together a very moving memorial service in recognition of those sworn officers who have given the ultimate sacrifice. The program included participation from the Boy Scouts, Park Ridge Community Church and Knights of Columbus. Thanks to all the police chaplains who assisted in this program.

The Kiwanis Clubs of Park Ridge hosted their annual Police/Fire Awards Program. This year's recipients include Officer Anthony Raitano, Social Worker Geri Silic, Volunteer John Hutchinson, Firefighters, David Malcolmson and Geoffrey Mleko. We are grateful to Kiwanis for hosting this program.

There were several other events in May. The City Council recognized crossing guard appreciation day at its May 1st meeting followed by an appreciation breakfast on May 2nd. The Department also co-sponsored a Mental Health Awareness Program in front of the Library on May 22nd. This program highlighted the importance of recognizing mental health issues without any stigma, and that there are resources available to assist people.

One of the highlights of the month was the Special Olympics Student Police Academy graduation. Over 24 students were recognized for their participation in the program, and the graduation program proved to be a great occasion for the participants and their families.

The Department also conducted a Town Hall meeting open to the entire city.

Two events with large crowds went off without any problems—Memorial Day Parade and the Beer Festival. Thanks to our volunteers for all their help.

The Farmer's Market opened this month with the addition of Prairie being closed. The first market was monitored by staff and everything went well.

This time of year is also popular for people scheduling their Ride to School/Lunch Certificates. Three were completed at Lincoln, Washington and Mary Seat schools.

Staff worked with FGM Architects on plans for the building issues and Special Olympics' Cop on Top raised about \$5,000 for Special Olympics.

Traffic Enforcement

- * Selective Enforcements at the following locations: 500 N Dee, Parkside and Burton, Michael John and Washington, 1500 S Cumberland, Uptown left turners, Cumberland and Gillick, Greenwood and Crescent, Cumberland and Crescent, and Courtland and Peterson.
- * Investigated multiple hit and runs.
- * Responded to a complaint that the tree canopy on Prospect and Oakton was obstructing the traffic signals and causing accidents. The scene was surveyed and determined that there was enough visibility.
- * LGH started their construction of the addition to the parking garage. The area was surveyed and the traffic was flowing as well as can be expected.
- * The Crash Data Analysis from Red Speed was received and the Top Ten Crash Intersections were released.
- * Responded to a resident complaint about loud mufflers on trucks at Granville and Ashland. No vehicles have been located matching this complaint.
- * A speed trailer was placed on Yost for speeding autos.
- * A speed study was completed at Hansen and Root and the results did not justify selective enforcement. The complainant was contacted with the results.
- * Responded to a resident complaint of speeding autos on Riverside Dr and Edgemont, along with loud motorcycles and loud mufflers. A speed trailer was deployed to that area along with some Children Play Here signs. Numerous speed studies have been done in that area that showed the speeds are consistent with normal traffic. The resident was notified.
- * Responded to a complaint about the intersection of Frances and Grace being uncontrolled. A crash study will be completed.
- * Responded to a resident complaint of speeding autos on south Merrill St. A speed study was deployed there and the resident was notified.
- * Responded to a resident complaint of a speeding auto on St. James.
- * Responded to a resident complaint of speeding autos on Cumberland and Gillick. The resident was informed that the area has a permanent selective enforcement speeding detail.
- * Checking into the viability of school bus cameras for stop sign violations.
- * Responded to a complaint of speeding autos at Edgemont and Meacham. A speed sentry was deployed.
- * Warning letters to be sent out for cars not stopping for bus arms at Field school.
- * Responded to a resident complaint of speeding autos on Granville near Vine and cars not stopping at stop signs at Vine and Granville. A selective enforcement has been created.
- * Responded to a speeding complaint in the area of Washington and Thorndale, a speed bump request, a crosswalk at Granville and Washington and a sidewalk at Jaycee Park. A speed study will be conducted and the resident was directed to Public Works and the Park District for other concerns.

1st Quarter Survey Results


Nature of Service




Location of Service




