Chief's Corner

Happy New Year! Let's all hope for a great 2017.

2017 started off with the swearing-in of two new recruits—Officer Elitsa Aptisheva and Officer Bart Marczyk. We welcome them both. They are attending the police academy at DuPage Community College. We anticipate their graduation at the end of March.

Deputy Chief Mellema has been selected to attend the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia from October 3 to December 15, 2017. This is a very prestigious management school and only a few people from Illinois are selected annually. All costs, except a few miscellaneous costs are paid for by the FBI. This is a great opportunity for Deputy Chief Mellema.

The Department started its partnership with Special Olympics, Project Unify and Maine South. A five session Citizen's Police Academy was developed by staff from the Police Department and Maine South for special needs students. The first class was held on January 18 with over twenty students. The first class was well received and will continue until May when there will be a graduation ceremony.

Staff worked with representatives from the Farmer's Market about expanding the Market onto Prairie. A plan was developed to close off the streets which will be implemented when the Market opens in May.

The Community Advisory Board grant program will start with the first meeting on February 10 at 10:00 am. Twenty-one people have been selected for the board.

Staff has worked on the proposed budget for 2017-2018. Staff has been preparing justifications for two requests—one for two additional police officer positions and one for enhancing the records staff.

Staff has also begun working on a new test for police officer positions. Our current list expires in September. Also a new sergeant's test is being scheduled.

In reference to West Suburban Consolidated Dispatch, a fifth department (Forest Park) will be joining the center in the next several months. This will result in a considerable reduction in our annual assessment fee.

- * Responded to a call from a concerned resident about speeding autos on Northwest Hwy and Dee, Glenview area. A speed sentry was deployed.
- * Followed up on a request for cars not stopping for kids in the crosswalk at Cumberland and Oakton for school zone times. The location was monitored and all cars were observed adhering to the pedestrians in the crosswalk and obeying the crossing guard.

- * Responded to a resident complaint of cars illegally parking at Tyrell and Manor, the complaint was referred to the Community Service Officers.
- * Assisted a resident with the data on the amount of traffic volume that goes by the residence on Oakton on a daily basis.
- * Responded to a complaint of speeding autos at Touhy and Home for west bound traffic. A speed sentry was deployed.
- * Responded to a call from a concerned resident about the traffic on Summit by the Metra Train Station. The resident wanted the speed limit lowered to 5 mph and a pedestrian sign placed. The request was forwarded to the city engineer and the resident was notified of the results.
- * Received a call from a concerned resident about the ongoing issue of cars being trapped on the railroad tracks between Summit and Main Street on Prospect.
- * Received a call from a resident concerned about stop sign violations at Park Plaine and Irwin. Follow-up is in process.
- * A resident requested that permanent speed signs be placed on Northwest Hwy and Dee. This issue will be brought up at the next traffic meeting.
- * Monitored Granville at Ashland for several weeks after receiving a resident complaint about loud trucks driving w/b on Granville. One citation was issued and no other offenders were found. No further complaints were received and enforcement was discontinued.

- * An LED traffic stop sign was given to a crossing guard at Northwest Hwy and Glenview to help assist with visibility while crossing the children.





